Daily Bible Reading Guide

Week 7: February 13-19

ur reading this week takes us to the third book of the Pentateuch, Leviticus. The book gets its name (as do the other 5 books of law) from the Septuagint, the Greek translation of the Hebrew scriptures. The Hebrew name is "the law of the priests." The book deals with the things pertaining chiefly to the Levites, and more specifically to the priests of this tribe, those given the responsibilities regarding sacrifices and offerings. To the New Testament Christian, the book ought to help us realize even more the importance of approaching God in the manner he prescribes, as well as having a better understanding of our importance as priests within His Kingdom (1 Peter 2:5, 9).

Some questions to consider as you are reading...

February 13 – Leviticus 1-4

- From where does God now speak to Moses? (1:1)
- To whom was Moses to give the commands God instructed? (1:2)
- How is the sacrifice offered in 1:3 described as far as it's quality and our willingness? How does this help us to understand how our offering to God should be?
- In 1:5, what family are the priests said to be of?
- How long was the offering to be? (3:17) Can we determine if this means time without end, or if it is a time determined by God?

• In chapter 4 sins of ignorance are discussed (2, 13, 22, 27). How is one to know to offer a sacrifice for their sins of ignorance?

February 14 – Leviticus 5-7

- In 5:1, what was the responsibility if one saw or heard another person sin? (Might help us to understand how one can become aware of "sins of ignorance"? cf Galatians 6:1)
 - In 6:12-14, what is said about the fire of the altar?
- To whom did Moses command to offer oblations? (7:38)

February 15 – Leviticus 8-10

- In chapter 10, why were Nadab and Abihu killed by the Lord?
- How did Aaron react to the righteous act of God? (10:3)

• Why were the priests forbidden to dring wine or strong drink? (10:9-11) [Some think that the sins of Nadab and Abihu were tied to this sin]

February 16 - Leviticus 11-13

- What kind of fish were among the unclean animals the Israelites were forbidden to eat? (11:9-10)
- What was to be done with the clothing of one diagnosed with leprosy? (13:52)

February 17 – Leviticus 14-15

• What if one was too poor to offer a prescribed offering? (14:21)

February 18 – Leviticus 16-18

- In chapter 16, what was the purpose of the two goats that Aaron was to offer?
- Why was the blood not to be eaten? (17:10-14)
- What acted as a preventative to the Israelites partaking of the sins of other nations? (18:30)

February 19 – Leviticus 19-21

- What helped to control the actions of one toward another? (19:17-18)
- If a man and woman were guilty of adultery, which was to be put to death? (20:10) (Could this help us to understand more of the actions of our Lord in John 8:1-11?)
