Introduction

- 1. Our trust must be firmly rooted in the LORD (Pr. 3:5-6).
- 2. He deserves our utmost respect and reverence (Pr. 3:7).
 - a. Blessings are attached to this behavior (Pr. 3:8).
- 3. Our giving must reflect our trust and reverence of the LORD (Pr. 3:9).
 - a. Blessings are attached to this behavior (Pr. 3:10).

I. "Honor the LORD with thy substance..." (Pr. 3:9)

- 1. The central sense of "honor" (kabed H3513) is "to be or become heavy."
 - a. When used negatively it speaks of difficulty, harshness, or heaviness (cf. <u>lsa. 6:10</u>).
 - b. In a positive sense, it denotes giving weight and thus honor, respect, or glory.
 - c. Those that honor God will be honored by Him (1 Sam. 2:30).
- 2. Substance (hon H1952) refers to wealth or riches thus possessions.
 - a. "**Wealth** *gotten* by vanity shall be diminished: But he that gathereth by labour shall increase" (<u>Pr. 13:11</u>).
 - b. "I have rejoiced in the way of thy testimonies, As *much as* in all **riches**" (Ps. 119:14).
 - c. The Septuagint (Greek translation of the Hebrew Bible) brings out the idea of just or God-approved methods of obtaining wealth in Proverbs 3:9.
- 3. God is the one that enables each of us to obtain wealth (Dt. 8:18).
 - a. The silver and gold belong to Him (Hag. 2:8).

II. "...And with the firstfruits of all thine increase" (Pr. 3:9)

- 1. The firstfruits are the best of our best.
 - a. Abel offered to God according to faith (Heb. 11:4).
 - b. Israel was required to give the firstfruits which was then given to the priests to provide for their needs (Dt. 26:1-11; Num. 18:12-19).
- 2. Increase (tebuah H8393) has to do with our income, produce, or revenue.
 - a. To give God the firstfruits of our income means then that we consider our income **before** taxes (cf. <u>Lk. 20:25</u>; <u>Rm. 13:1-7</u>), bills, necessities, and *especially* luxuries when we decide what to give to Him.

- 3. The Israelites were not to hesitate or put off giving their best (Ex. 22:29).
 - a. liquors (*dema* H1831) "**best drippings**, best juice of the grape crop or finest oil of the olive vat, i.e., the juice drippings of a grape or olive press vat, not the compressed portions, but the unpressed, especially good, without bitterness or sediment (<u>Ex 22:28</u>[EB 29]+), as a sacrifice" (DBL Hebrew).
 - b. God and procrastination do not go together (Hag. 1:1-11)!

III. "So shall thy barns be filled with plenty, And thy presses shall burst out with new wine" (Pr. 3:10)

- 1. Jesus said it is more blessed to give than to receive (Ac. 20:35).
 - a. He also said to give, and it shall be given to you (Lk. 6:38).
- 2. God challenged Judah to give properly and see if they had room enough to receive an abundant blessing from Him (Mal. 3:10-12).
- 3. We might shy away from teaching this because it sounds like "health and wealth" or "prosperity" false doctrine.
 - a. If the motive for giving is selfishness we already know that it is condemned (cf. Ac. 8:18-23).
 - b. We know for a fact that God will take care of our **needs** now if we put Him first (Mt. 6:25-34).
 - c. We know for a fact that God will bless His faithful children abundantly in eternity (Jn. 14:2-3; cf. Eph. 1:3; 2 Pt. 1:11).
 - d. <u>Meditate on this</u>: who better to bless with prosperity than the one who will honor God with the firstfruits and give to others in need?

Conclusion

- 1. The Lord's church should be the most generous givers there are.
 - a. It is one of the ways that we honor God.
 - b. It is one of the ways that we show the love of God to others.
- 2. God gave us His very best in sending His Son.
 - a. The least we can do is give Him the best of our best!
