## Introduction

- 1. Sanctification requires us to work together with God in order to achieve the desired result.
- 2. It is possible to be sanctified (Jd. 1-2).
- 3. The Corinthians were sanctified (1 Cor. 1:2; cf. 1 Cor. 6:11).
  - a. Yet they had some serious issues to overcome (cf. <u>1 Cor. 1:10-13</u>, <u>3:1-4</u>, <u>5:1-13</u>, etc.).
  - b. This teaches us that sanctification requires work!

## I. God Has Done His Part for Sanctification

- 1. God sent and sanctified His Son Jesus.
  - a. The Father sent Jesus to do His will (Jn. 5:30; cf. Jn. 4:34, 6:40, 8:16-18).
  - b. The Father sanctified Jesus (Jn. 10:36).
- 2. Jesus sanctified Himself (Jn. 17:19).
  - a. Jesus is the master example of sanctification (1 Cor. 1:30).
  - b. If we are to be like Jesus, we too must sanctify ourselves.
- 3. God sent His Son so that He may be sacrificed to achieve our sanctification.
  - a. The offering of the body of Jesus (Heb. 10:1-14).
  - b. The blood of Christ (Heb. 10:29, 13:12).
- 4. God sent His Word spoken through His Son (<u>Jn. 12:48-50</u>, <u>14:10</u>, <u>24</u>; <u>Heb. 1:1-2</u>).
  - a. God's Word, which is truth, sanctifies (Jn. 17:17, 19).
  - b. We cannot achieve sanctification without proper knowledge **and** application of God's Word.
- 5. God promised to send the Holy Spirit to the apostles to guide them into all truth (Ac. 1:4-8; cf. Lk. 24:49).
  - a. Jesus dealt with this in detail in John 14-16.
  - b. God kept His promise (cf. Ac. 2:1ff).
  - c. We will examine in detail the Holy Spirit's role in sanctification next Lord's day morning.

## II. We Must Do Our Part for Sanctification

- 1. We must understand who God is.
  - a. God is **not** nature (<u>Gen. 1:31-2:2</u>; cf. <u>Ps. 8</u>).
  - b. God is **not** a man (Num. 23:19; cf. Isa. 55:8-9).
  - c. God is to be sanctified (<u>Isa. 8:13</u>; <u>1 Pt. 3:15</u>).
  - d. God's name is to be sanctified (<u>Isa. 29:23</u>).
- 2. We must have faith (<u>Ac. 26:18</u>).
  - a. But not a dead faith (<u>Jm. 2:14-26</u>).
  - b. Faith comes by hearing the Word of God and the Word of God sanctifies (Rm. 10:17; Jn. 17:17).
- 3. We must understand sanctification will cost us something.
  - a. Sin costs (Rm. 6:23).
  - b. Job understood this (<u>Job 1:5</u>).
  - c. We must give God our holy (sanctified) lives (Rm. 12:1-2).
- 4. We must be washed in order to be sanctified.
  - a. The Israelites had to be washed before approaching God (Ex. 19:10, 14).
  - b. The priests had to be washed before approaching God (Ex. 29:4).
  - c. It was no accident that the tabernacle, and later the temple, had a laver for washing before it could be entered by the priests for offerings (<u>Ex.</u> 30:18-21).
  - d. Washing comes **before** sanctification (<u>1 Cor. 6:9-11</u>).
- 5. We must understand sanctification is a process.
  - a. Sanctification takes time (2 Ch. 29:5, 17; cf. Ex. 19:10-11).
  - b. Sometimes those who should be sanctified the most fall short (2 Ch. 30:1-3, 15-17).
  - c. Remember the issues the Corinthians had to overcome?
